## Germany nominated to host WRTC 2018

Published: 15 May 2015

On Sunday, October 5, 2014 the World Radio Team Championship (WRTC) Sanctioning Committee selected Germany as the host nation for the WRTC 2018. This nomination followed an initiative of DARC, BCC and RRDXA, initiated during the Ham Radio fair Friedrichshafen at the end of June 2014. A small team, headed by Christian Janssen, DL1MGB, was set up in order to explore the option to hold this event in Germany.

Since 1990, WRTC has been held regularly in different locations. For one week, it brings together some 60 teams from all over the world, who then compete in the IARU HF Team Championship under field day conditions. The last WRTC was held in New England/USA. Only a few weeks ago, it ended with a bronze medal for Germany.

During the next weeks, the team will launch an official organization to finance and conduct WRTC2018 in Germany. The team is recruiting volunteers, in the fields public relations, location management, accommodation and social events.

Three geographical regions within Germany are currently under evaluation and one of them will be selected as the venue for WRTC 2018: the area near Muenster/Westfalen, the area Maerkisch Oderland east of Berlin and the area around Jessen/Wittenberg.

# WRTC2018 Work group met in Rheine

On Saturday, 22nd November 2014 the WRTC2018 working group of RRDXA and BCC met in the town of Rheine near Münster for the second meeting. Chairman Christian Janßen, DL1MGB, summarized the activities of the past months, especially our successful application.

The main subject of the meeting was the final decision on the WRTC qualification process, which defines contest and category weights. As promised, the final rules will be published by the end of November.

Other topics of the meeting were financing, foundation of the formal WRTC 2018 organization, and marketing related topics. Lots of details have been discussed and new ideas were born. For example, we consider contesting events focused on young radio amateurs as part of the WRTC2018 project.

On Sunday, a small group explored the region east of the town of Lingen, which will be one of our candidate regions. The region called "Emsland" offers a completely flat environment, thus providing a leveled playing field. Its topography will support a fair competition.

## WRTC 2018 organizers met at Jessen

On August 15th the WRTC 2018 Organizing Committee met for a workshop at Jessen in Saxony-Anhalt. At the beginning of the meeting Michael Jahn, the Mayor of Jessen, was acquainted with the project. Michael Jahn expressed his pleasure about the choice of Jessen as the host of the "Olympic Games of Amateur Radio" and passed his thanks to the radio amateurs of the region for their outstanding work.

Organizing the project was the main focus of the agenda. Treasurer, Wolfhard Goldschmidt, DL9ZWG, reported a good start particularly due to a great number of donations from German radio amateurs. Christian Janssen, DL1MGB, the chairman of the Organizing Committee, presented the tool selected for the project management and explained the project schedule. To keep frictional losses at a minimum public relations work was reorganized with the main responsibility currently in the hands of Michael Hoeding, DL6MHW. In future Ben Buettner, DL6RAI, will look after IT matters.

A further important topic for discussion concerned the 60 sites that will be required for the actual WRTC contest in 2018. Supported by radio amateurs from Saxony and Brandenburg, Andreas Winter, DK4WA, has already mapped more than 80 sites that promise excellent conditions. In this context environmental care was also addressed as this issue is considered most important. In the Organizing Committee Andreas Winter will take regional responsibility for all local activities in the Jessen/Wittenberg area.

With regard to the detailed shaping of the rules of the competition Uwe Koennecker, DL8OBF, has published an analysis and the results of the discussion that he had initiated in the WRTC-2018 Mailing List. In this discussion experienced WRTC-competitors of the past have expertly discussed the pros and cons of MS- and M/2 operation. In the discussions at Jessen further aspects especially from the view of the organizers were supplemented. After this opinion-forming process Uwe will prepare a draft of the rules for the actual WRTC-contest in the course of the next weeks.

Finally, it was suggested to hold the next general meeting of the WRTC 2018 e.V. after the RRDXA spring meeting that is traditionally scheduled on the 2nd weekend in March at Waltrop.

# WRTC 2018 – just another 1000 days to go

Published: 15 October 2015

October 16th, 2015 is a special date in the preparations for the WRTC (World Radiosport Team Championship). Exactly 1000 days are left before the opening of the WRTC on July 11th, 2018. It was almost one year ago that Germany was awarded to host the WRTC by the WRTC Sanctioning Committee (WRTC SC). That is why we want to look back at first results and to look forward towards the future.

#### In the past year first important results have been achieved

- The world-wide qualification process has been running since February 2015. Current results have been published under http://www.wrtc2018.de in the Web and are steadily being upgraded. So far about 15 000 radio amateurs have participated in the 13 previous qualification contests, more than 1300 of them from Germany.
- "WRTC 2018 e.V" was founded and has been recognized as a charitable non-profit association. Donations of about EUR 55.000 have already been acquired safeguarding about 14% of the total costs.

- The area around Jessen/Wittenberg has been chosen to host the event. It offers an ideal playing-field for the contest and an excellent infra-structure with a great number of radio amateurs in the region.
- World-wide interest in the WRTC is mirrored in discussions, publications and the social media.

#### Targets for the year ahead:

- The specification and testing of the technical equipment will be an important task for that a WRTC-field-test will be held on the second weekend in July.
- Increasing the fund-raising efforts shall get further sponsors on board. "WRTC 2018 e.V." is talking to international manufacturers and clubs as well as to regional sponsors with the goal that more than half the required funds can be raised by radio amateurs themselves.
- "WRTC 2018" will show continuous presence at important amateur radio fairs and in the press. We can be addressed at any time and we are prepared to answer all questions about this extraordinary event in radiosport.
- The last qualification contests will be in November 2016. We are planning to publish provisional results at the end of that year, but due to possibly narrow scores corrections are to be expected after the official publishing of the final results of all qualification contests.

#### Summary

Project "WRTC 2018" has been launched successfully and important sub-goals are well on track. The next 1000 day will be full of manifold tasks that will be jointly tackled by radio amateurs from the Jessen/Wittenberg area, from Germany, and from all over the world.

Additionally to ham fairs WRTC2018 shall be represented at club meetings and other amateur radio events. Possible approaches for that were discussed. Further information material is being prepared.

The exploration of potential contest sites promises excellent playing fields, while the necessary legal framework and possible environmental restrictions are still waiting to be negotiated. Furthermore, Wittenberg is a most interesting tourist attraction that offers a great number of historical sites to be found within a small area.

All in all the planning is on target, but a host of details, problems and queries take a lot of time for the Organizing Committee. We look optimistically to the year 2018.

#### WRTC Test Session 2016

Published: 07 July 2016

(Wittenberg, 7th July 2016) During the second weekend of July, exactly two years before the ham radio Olympics in Germany, the WRTC team meets for a first test session in the Jessen/Wittenberg area. We will set up the selected antennas at five sites and test this configuration in a real contest.

The test session addresses several goals. The first is to evaluate the antenna system and the setup procedure with different teams to detect optimization potentials. Furthermore, planning and logistics will be evaluated.

Additionally, we focus on public relations bringing the WRTC spirit to the residents of the region and to regional newspapers and TV stations. Moreover, we check the radio characteristics of the different sites using the world-wide CW skimmer network. Beside this, five teams will take part in the IARU HF Championship contest with the goal to find the best team in an internal competition.

The planned callsigns for this radio activity are

- for the contest: DD5M, DK2O, DR1X, DM5D and DR5L
- for the CW skimmer test: DB2B, DK7C, DM3W, DP9A and DR3W

The general goal of the test session is to learn and to detect chances for improvement in equipment and processes.

#### More details:

- Sites: The five sites represent the maximal extension of the planned WRTC 2018 area. Zossen is the most northern point whereas Elbe-Elster represents the most southern site. Thus, we can evaluate differences in radio characteristics. Moreover, we can spread out public relation activities to the local regions and communities.
- Planning and Logistics: Despite the fact that only five sites will be occupied in 2016 the test session is a useful and challenging prototype event for the WRTC 2018. For example, one kilometer of coaxial cable exceeds by far the quantity used for a standard fieldday station. The test session brings together about forty volunteers from all over Germany, travelling hundreds of kilometers to make the test session a success. This shows the strength of the WRTC idea that has already become alive in the German ham community.
- Public Relations: WRTC 2018 e. V. has invited journalists from local newspapers as well as
  from local TV stations to a press conference and a visit of a typical WRTC site. Moreover, the
  WRTC organizing committee has invited local politicians, landowners, farmers and residents
  to visit the sites and to learn how WRTC is working.
- CW-Skimmer Test: Following the approach of WRTC 2014 about 10 CW skimmers in EU and DX will protocol the transmission of the test stations. To evaluate that we have developed a plan defining timeslots, bands and directions for our transmissions.
- Contest: Two OP teams join the IARU contest in defined contest periods. Because Skimmer
  test and other activities are quite time consuming only limited time is available for the actual
  contest. Thus, an internal contest has been established to find the test session champion –
  for our excellent participants this is a real challenge.
- Team Building: Despite the fact that the volunteers only know each other from the bands and small projects the test session represents a new level in cooperative work. Moreover, many tasks are new, and several aspects bear the label "work in progress". Therefore, the social aspect of the test session should not be underestimated.

The WRTC test session 2016 shows the spirit of cooperation and innovation. As a learning organization WRTC 2018 e. V. tries to make an important step towards evaluating the technology and proceedings for a successful German WRTC in 2018.

#### Base mounted YAESU Rotator to control the WRTC Beam

Published: 07 October 2016

As successfully implemented by many DXpeditions the WRTC beam will be rotated by a rotator mounted at the base of the tower supporting the beam. This setup has been successfully tested in July 2016 at five different locations of the designated contest area near the city of Jessen, situated to the south west of Berlin, Germany.

The rotator is mounted on a sturdy base plate. The telescoping tower is affixed to the top of the rotator by a set of clamps. The heavy-duty G-1000 DXC rotor will be exclusively used for the WRTC event. It has been donated by our Prime Sponsor YAESU.

The big advantage of this mechanical arrangement is the fact that the heavy rotator does not need to be pushed up when manually telescoping the antenna tower. Furthermore, the center of gravity is considerably lowered which translates into additional stability of the entire arrangement. Last not least a reduction of the wind surface is achieved and wiring the rotor as well as the initial positioning of the antenna becomes more comfortable.

The YAESU G-1000 DXC is sufficiently robust and features adequate torque to rotate the beam into any direction even in heavy winds and even without using proper thrust bearings. The telescoping aluminum mast - sponsored by Spiderbeam - supports the Spiderbeam at a height of 15m (45'). This is a reasonable height for a low angle take off of the antenna, which in turn should make the signals of the WRTC competitors sufficiently audible in the US and in Japan in spite of the fact that the competitors must not use more than 100 W of RF output power.

The experience gained and the lessons learned during the July tests will contribute to iron out any possible wrinkles.



## WR1TC active in WAG Contest in HQ modus

To support WRTC2018 in Germany a group of US-hams lead by N1RR have organized a multi-operator activity to participate in the WAG this weekend. They will be on the air as WR1TC, the special call sign of the WRTC 2014 at Boston.

Like in HQ-operations in the IARU-contest they will take part simultaneously in CW and SSB on all bands with 2 stations each on 80m to 20m. It will be up to condx if fast NA-pile-ups will be possible on 15 and 10m.

Apart from points and multipliers WR1TC will count as a "joker" for the WWQR-award that can be applied for via DCL.

For German hams the WAG is a rich source of points for various awards, e.g. the top grades of the WWQR can be reached in these 24 hours especially as the new special call sign DF0WRTC will be on the air as well.

## WRTC 2018 Official Competition Rules Released

WRTC 2018 e.V., host of the 2018 World Radiosport Team Championship, announced that the official competition rules have been published at http://wrtc2018.de/index.php/en/competition.

These are the rules that will be relevant for all WRTC 2018 competitors. "Thanks to everyone who has provided feedback during the rules review process," said Uwe Koenneker, DL8OBF, Director of the WRTC 2018 Rules Committee. "We have discussed the rules with potential competitors by e-mail as well as with the WRTC Sanctioning Committee. Publishing the rules about 20 months before the event gives potential competitors the chance to practice according to these rules."

"Based on the fabulous job done by the WRTC 2014 Committee in Boston, we have adopted the concept of Two-Operator Two-Transmitter competition," continued Koenneker. "Both stations will be permitted to transmit at any time to maximize their scoring and the fun of the world wide WRTC community."

Significant changes address the use of modern contest technology such as Software Defined Radio. For instance - whereas waterfall displays were not allowed in WRTC 2014 - nowadays this technology is standard and provided by most top transceivers. Therefore, displaying waterfall, spectrum and peak hold will be part of the game in WRTC 2018. However, focusing on operator skill any decoding assistance, e.g. by CW skimmer, is strictly forbidden.

Furthermore, some minor amendments are implemented in the rules. E.g. the WRTC 2014 has shown that the interface between station audio and referee headphone can cause time consuming issues. Therefore, the teams may provide a headphone for the referee to avoid this problem.

The CQWW CW was the last qualification contest for the WRTC 2018. With the claimed scores published last week we did a pre-final compilation of the qualification standings.

Despite the still missing results of the All Asia Contest the situation in several regions is clear.

With a difference of more than 1000 qualification points between the last qualification rank and the first follower we realize quite a stable situation in AS#2, AS#5, EU#6, NA#2, NA#5, NA#6, NA#7, OC#1, OC#2 and SA#2.

Very close, with a difference of less than 100 points, the situation in AF, AS#1, AS#3, AS#4, AS#6, EU#2 and EU#5 has not yet been decided. This is an indicator of the intensive fight until the last contests and the hard competition in these regions.

We are ready to calculate the final results when all final contest scores have been published, hoping that neither disqualifications nor missing data will confuse the final publication.

In the last two years we have faced high level radiosport in all regions of the world. Thank you for that. The qualification was accompanied by several discussions of an optimal qualification process. Fixing regions, contests and their weighting for a WRTC is quite sensitive. We have to thank the organizers from Brazil, Russia and the USA for their support in designing the qualification based on contest results.

We also hope to see the 9th WRTC with new ideas and improvements in the qualification procedure.



Then you should apply as a WRTC-referee! Help to make the next Olympics of Ham Radio possible and get access to the shack of some of the world's best contesters."

The referee selection process is being led by Ulf Ehrlich, DL5AXX. "We are looking for qualified contesters to serve as referees. Numerous excellent applications reached the committee. We are sure the selected teams will play an important role in the 2018 championship and will fight for top places.

Team #4 is led by Andrei Ruse, YO3JR, from Romania. He pointed out that his existing interest in radio contesting was amplified following the WRTC event in 2000 in Slovenia. Only 26 years old Andy took part in WRTC 2006 in Brasilia and also came back for the WRTCs in Russia 2010 and USA 2014. He is an example of how the WRTC and ham radio in general have a huge impact on young hams in improving operating skills as well as their tactical and technical abilities. These are the main ingredients required in order to be considered a top contester.

Team #5 is led by Ivo Pezer, E73A/9A3A. Ivo can be called an WRTC veteran. As a team leader he took part in three previous WRTCs in San Francisco 1996, Slovenia 2000 and Brazil 2006. He missed WRTC 2014 only because of a visa problem. Ivo's competitiveness is documented by outstanding contest scores resulting in an excellent qualification score in the very competitive EU#5 region. As an employee of the UN he has traveled to many countries, operating as a single op or part of multi op teams. Ivo plans to implement advanced SDR technology with the help of his announced team mate Ranko, 4O3A. This will again underline the impact of the WRTC movement on technological progress in ham radio contesting.

The selection of sponsored teams is now finished. WRTC 2018 has more excellent applications and every applicant would be an excellent team leader for the event. Unfortunately, we are limited to only five sponsored teams.

Chris, DL1MGB, president of the WRTC 2018 Organizing Committee, announced, "After two very exciting years of competition, we received the results from the final qualifying event. And now we are ready to receive the competitors' applications. It will be exciting to see who earns a place in the competition."

#### WRTC Test Session 2017

Published: 18 June 2017

In preparation for WRTC 2018, the second WRTC test day will take place from the 23rd to the 25th of June in Jessen and surrounding area. The focus will be on testing logistics and training the support teams. Radio operation and event reporting through social media will also take place during the tests. Nearly 100 volunteers are coming from all over Germany to build the fifteen stations.

Preparations have been underway for several weeks. Under Ralf, DK1DSA's control, all required equipment, from large to very small items were sourced to ensure the smooth running of the tests. Oskar, DL3OF, with many enthusiastic supporters has stocked the warehouse from which the WRTC sites will be supplied with equipment.

#### **Training**

By Thursday evening, under the direction of Paul, DL5CW, the last preparation work will be completed so that the antenna training planned for Friday in Prettin can be tackled without delay. Friday evening will see the training of all the teams of helpers. The teams were chosen by Axel, DL6KVA, who will also coordinate the helpers in 2018.

Saturday will concentrate training on how sites are to be built. The fifteen teams will go to their sites and will be supplied with the required equipment by dedicated delivery vehicles. The goal is to assemble all structures quickly and smoothly, while documenting any areas where the process can be optimized.

#### Radio operation and test

After each site is set up, radio operation is planned. This is mainly to test the online scoreboard system and as publicity for WRTC 2018. Measurements to compare the performance of sites are not planned. The radio operators in each location will decide how they will operate. On the low bands many DL OMs will undoubtedly call, as the 15 test session stations have specially assigned DOKs (club codes) WTT01 to WTT15. It is to be expected that there will be a lot of DX traffic in the evening on 20m or 15m as in the US it is the ARRL Field Day and many stations will be on the air. North America will surely be the main source for DX points at the World Championships next year.

A special diploma for contacts with the test stations is planned. To qualify a log must be submitted, which will then be compared with the logs of the test session stations. Details about the diploma and how to submit a request will be published soon.

#### Evaluation and social media

On Sunday, all WRTC sites will be dismantled and the material checked and stored. It is very important that we collect and evaluate the ideas and suggestions for improvement at this point. We will try to let other amateurs view the event through live pictures on our Facebook page. Hamnet experiments are also planned. So, it is worth watching social media to get an idea how WRTC works. For us, this is also an experiment that should help us to evaluate the best techniques and new possibilities for 2018.

## WRTC Testsession 2017 - Logistics, Technology, Hamspirit

The WRTC test day 2017 brought together more than 100 volunteers in the Jessen/Wittenberg region, to set up field day stations at 15 locations.

After the devastating storms on Thursday that had made the journey difficult for some, on Saturday morning all the teams were on site. The focus on Friday was the training of the participants, in particular the antenna teams. The training occurred at the campsite in Prettin. On Friday evening, further test participants arrived, filling the meadow with caravans and tents. Apart from the locals, there were also amateurs from Bavaria, the North and Baltic Sea coasts as well as from the far west of Germany. Not only were well-known faces from the test day in 2016 again present but also many new enthusiastic contesters between the ages of 20 and 80 years. Saturday was the main construction day.

The 15 locations were supplied with all materials using four transporters. The remote locations near Lübben and Zossen had to be patient for some time. In addition to the large items such as masts, Spiderbeams, tents, coax cable and generators there were also many tools and small parts to be transported. They were in "Box 1" and "Box 2", which also contained such useful and important parts as the red permanent markers and the lotion used for hand washing without water. The largest part, the solid floor, was delivered directly to the sites.

In all locations, antennas and infrastructure were built without any major problems. The wind made the antenna erection somewhat more difficult - fortunately the weather was sunny and dry. Site assembly required hard, concentrated work to ensure that all parts were correctly installed – essential for the correct operation of the stations.

After many hours of construction work it was then time for radio operation, recreation and exchange of experiences. Lessons learned notes were recorded and are now included in all further planning. The atmosphere was excellent - the mixture of hard work and amateur flair conjured up enthusiasm into many faces. New friendships have emerged, many ideas were born.

On Sunday morning the stations were dismantled. There was a schedule of when the materials would be picked up so that each team could dismantle accordingly. From 11 o'clock onwards the transporters arrived in the camps. At 3 pm everything was packed up.

Excellent preparation and the Ham Spirit of all participants made the test day a total success. We can look optimistically to 2018 when we will welcome 63 teams to Germany. For this, we need further support, e.g. Donations or registrations as volunteer helpers for the World Radio Team Championships 2018.

### Teams nominated for WRTC 2018 Competition

WRTC 2018 e.V., organizer and host of the World Radiosport Team Championship (WRTC) 2018, is proud to announce the 63 teams that will be invited to compete in Germany next July.

WRTC is a competition among two-operator teams. Team Leaders have now been selected for each qualifying region based on 2 years of qualifying contest scores. The Team Leaders were given the option to select any operator as a Team Mate to complete their team.

The team application and verification process was managed by Ulf Ehrlich, DL5AXX. Ulf pointed out: "This will be a very competitive field. The top three teams of WRTC 2014 in Boston will participate once again in the 2018 event!"

The five sponsored teams, all representing high level contesters, have already been announced some time ago. The selection of the Youth and Wild Card Teams required a more formal application process and, therefore, could only be completed recently.


WRTC 2018 e.V. has received seven applications from Youth Teams, representing contesters younger than 25. The selection was based on the number of qualification points, as defined in the rules. Team Leaders will be CE2MVF (9107 points), YO8TTT (7254 points) and HA8RT (5056 points). These results made it easy to decide in favor of the three Youth Teams invited to participate in the WRTC 2018 competition.

Issuing Wild Cards has been an entirely different process. Similar to the approach taken by the organizers of the WRTC 2014 in Boston we have selected UN9LW (with Team Mate UN7LZ), who missed the qualification criteria by just 24 points. Honoring the cleanest log of high scorers ZL3CW (with F6BEE) was offered another Wild Card. Because of the close competition in region EU#5 featuring outstanding results another Wild Card was offered to 9A7DX (with 9A3LG) to join WRTC 2018. We also invited YV1DIG, performing excellently behind the curtain of zone 9 DXpedition stations. Finally, we unanimously selected K1DG, chairman of the WRTC 2014, well known top level contester, and champion of the first WRTC in 1990. Not only did he do an outstanding job in Boston. By offering a Wild Card to him we also wanted to express our appreciation and thanks to all of the many fine people making WRTC 2014 in Boston such a great success. His Team Mate will be N2NT - 2014 Competition Director and number five in NA#1 with 10.6 k points.

When making the announcement, WRTC 2018 President Christian Janssen, DL1MGB, stated: "We are pleased to see a mix of veterans of previous WRTC events and first-time participants among the competitors. The teams represent over 35 countries and a wide range of personal backgrounds. While the focus will be on the competition, we are looking forward to hosting the teams and celebrating a week of ham spirit together with competitors, organizers, volunteers and sponsors during the WRTC week."

## WRTC 2018 is coming - 250 days to go

There are now just 250 days to WRTC 2018 in Jessen/Wittenberg. A lot has already happened - but there is still a lot left to be done and time flies. In recent months, important subprojects have been finished.

- The qualification stage is completed with the applications received from and invitations sent out to the participants.
- At the IARU Contest, several WRTC 2018 participants visited Germany and have already evaluated propagation routes and station equipment.
- During the big test day, 100 volunteers at 15 locations tested the WRTC 2018 technology and logistics.
- Here as well as at "Ham Radio" in Friedrichshafen you could feel a great deal of the Ham spirit, which carries us along the way to WRTC 2018.

The most important aspect of the WRTC is of course the sport. Meanwhile, the participants are confirmed (see Participants Page). To mark 250-days out from the event we asked the participants a few questions and asked them to tell us about their enthusiasm.

#### Generation-Connecting Sport

Looking at the age structure of the WRTC 2018, a picture emerges that makes amateur radio sport something special. The youngest participant is Bryant, KG5HVO, at the age of 14. The oldest is the well-known Contester Marwyn, N5AW, at the age of 77. In between, all age groups are represented almost equally, so that we will experience amateur radio not only as a global sport but also as a generation-connecting one. All participants compete in the same competition and on the same level.

Almost all of the participants started amateur radio as teenagers, i.e. they acquired their first license as a teenager and continued into a lifelong radio sport passion. The survey showed an average age of 13.3 years when the competitor's first amateur radio license was achieved.

Asked about who was expected to be on the podium, the reigning World Champions N6MJ / KL9A were mentioned several times. Several answers favored the medalists of the previous two World Championships. There were also calls such as "It's time for the German team!" Or "EU teams" from the participants. It's going to be exciting.

The expectations of the German organizers were pretty much the same. K5WA writes: "TNX a lot for all you are doing to make WRTC 2018 a success. You have my respect!". With this motivation, the organizing team and the many volunteers will continue to work hard for the next 256 days, so that on July 16, 2018, we can select the next World RadioSport Champion.

The Judging Committee is responsible for certifying the results of the competition. Ulf Ehrlich DL5AXX is leading the committee of Dietmar Kasper, DL3DXX, Nodir Tursoon-Zadeh, EY8MM, Randy Thompson, K5ZD, and Bernd Länger, VK2IA.

## WRTC 2018 - Organization meeting in Berlin

On January 6, the WRTC organizers met in Berlin to discuss final event planning. Because of the very extensive agenda, the meeting started at 8 o'clock and lasted until late in the evening. A total of 14 topics were discussed, from detailed event planning to IT, financing and the management of the volunteer helpers.



With regards to financing, some additional costs still have to be met. The lead fund raiser Rudolf DJ3WE, however is confident that the funds will be raised over the next few months thanks to our donors. The delivery of the station packages from the 1st. of February will be an important milestone.

The big challenge in the next few weeks is recruiting about 150 additional on-site volunteers. In particular, site managers are being sought who will look after the competition sites and the competitors in the field. Many questions were discussed, and solutions agreed. For example, it was decided that all on-site helpers would be invited to the grand award ceremony on the Monday evening. In the next few weeks, a special presentation of the active clubs and participants will be provided.



The WRTC 2018 e.V. has implemented the VOTA diploma scheme to recognize the work of the volunteers who will, on air during 2018, give out exclusive VOTA numbers from their own stations that count towards the VOTA award scheme. The diploma and awards can now be applied for via the DCL page on the DARC website.

All previously open questions had solution proposals developed and assigned to the responsible people. There is still lots to do so that German WRTC will deliver the expected success.

### Volunteers-On-The-Air - WRTC 2018 e.V. Announces VOTA Award

Published: 12 January 2018

WRTC 2018 e.V. - VOTA Award for 2018. This award recognizes that the volunteers are at the core of the radio world team championship in Germany without whom it would not be possible. Volunteers, set up antennas and tents, look after the competition sites and participants and work in the event office.

Each registered volunteer has an exclusive VOTA number for 2018 and can give it out though his or her amateur radio activities. The volunteer thus represents the WRTC on the air.

The VOTA Award can be applied for via the DCL (DARC Community Logbook https://dcl.darc.de). The exact diploma conditions are documented on the web page. The diploma application is generated automatically and the VOTA numbers list stored in the DCL.

So far, over 125 VOTA numbers have been issued. The current list is located at VOTA list Among the list is exotic number DP-001, which will hopefully be activated soon by DP1POL (DL5XL).

A first activity hour is scheduled for Sunday 14th. January from 8 to 9 UTC on 80 m. Many volunteers want to be QRV and distribute their VOTA number. Activity hour contacts added to QSOs in the subsequent 10-m contest may make it possible for the first VOTA Award (number 1) to be awarded.

### WRTC teams will operate RDXC this weekend

The ongoing Russian DX Contest will include a significant number of WRTC teams testing equipment and operating. RDXC is the ideal contest for that: it is mixed mode and has a M2 category, allowing the simultaneous operation of two radios. This is quite similar to WRTC rules, so many teams will bring their filters and triplexes into action.

We heard rumors that Manfred DJ5MW, is traveling to Sweden to join Stefan DL1IAO, for a test with SM9A. Tim K3LR, is coming to Germany to operate DR8A with his team mate Sandy DL1QQ. DA0AA is "manned" by Maddin DL4NAC and Irina DL8DYL. Whereas RDXC will deliver nice pile-ups the teams will probably also need time to optimize their equipment.

Thus, the final score achieved in RDXC will be not the main priority because the score in the World Radiosport Team Championship in July 2018 will be the final destination of each team's four year journey.

## WRTC 2018 - Fundraising - a look at the current situation

Published: 20 March 2018

About a hundred days before the start of WRTC 2018, it's time to take a look at the fundraising status.

Rudolf DJ3WE, who took over the management of the fundraising team at the beginning of the year, informs us that so far donations of about €500,000 have been received. Rudolf has been part of the fundraising team since 2016 working with our major sponsors including YAESU and WiMo. He brings along the necessary skills for dealing with business partners through over 30 years of professional experience in various business positions.

Of the total amount raised so far, nearly €200,000 is from donations from some 900 individual donors coming predominantly from Germany (74%) and North America (21%). In addition, around €70,000 were donated to us by amateur radio clubs. This includes €10,000 each, from DARC districts and local German clubs.

Tent sponsorship has contributed €65,000 to the sum. We received a further €75,000 from sponsored teams, i.e. competitors who pay to take part rather than qualifying through other contests. Companies have supported us with a total of almost €90,000. Direct donations and company discounts account for another €100,000.

Thank you to all donors and supporters.

Overall, our current finances cover approximately 97 percent of our estimated costs. However uncertainties exist, including possible tax payments due, so we are not yet quite able to say we have accumulated the required finances. Overall however it looks good.

We hope to be able to raise the remaining funds required in the next 100 days and look forward to receiving every donation large or small.

## WPX SSB contest THIS COMING WEEKEND is your chance to work the bigger WRTC team.

The upcoming WPX SSB contest (March 24-25, 2018) will fill the band with thousands of contest calls. Among the crowd there will be a number of the larger WRTC team.

What do we mean by larger WRTC team? WRTC is not only an event for the 126 active competitors. There are also 63 referees performing the hard job of observing 2 channels of high speed qso traffic for 24 hours. Beside this there are more than 300 volunteers working in support roles. For instance, Dave, K3ZJ, will give out K-001 and Manfred DK2OY, DL-016.

The wrtc.xdt file also contains the calls and names of all competitors and referees. Please import the file into your contest logging program and give the WRTC TEAM a short "GO WRTC" to motivate them for the very special event coming up in summer 2018.


Just skip the registration page and navigate to the offers. You will find three section: Hotels, Events, and Sightseeing. (You can ignore the Hotels tab.)

The plans are progressing. The allocation of the site based teams, who support individual competition locations is in its final phase.





A highlight of the "Funktag" event was the handing over to the WRTC of a donation by DIG (Diplom Interessen Gruppe). DIG supplied the WRTC 2018 organisation with a cheque for 1000 Euros. The DIG members see the WRTC as falling into the tradition of the DIG, which has been committed to radio sport and awards for the last 50 years. Related to the WRTC, Hajo, DJ9MH, the Awards Manager of the WWQR (Worked WRTC Qualification Regions) and an active DIG member reported that almost 1900 award certificates have been issued. During the WRTC 2018 there will also be some limited time award competitions. The WRTC 2018 e.V. would like to thank the DIG for their kind donation and the support and advice given.

#### Five new awards for WRTC 2018

Published: 02 May 2018

Wittenberg (DF9XV). The list of WRTC award certificates is getting longer: five more will be added to the two existing award programs for the WRTC which will take place on the 14th. and 15th. of July. "With our awards, we want to increase the already large, international interest in the WRTC, creating for the WRTC competitors good sized pile-up's to work. We also wish to reward all the YLs and OMs that make the pile-ups in the competition possible." said Michael Höding, DL6MHW, from the WRTC organizing team. The previous award programs WWQR and VOTA raised great interest: Awards Manager Hajo Weigand, DJ9MH, has already issued more than 1800 award certificates.

Those who reach all WRTC stations can download the "Worked All WRTC Stations (WAWRTC)" diploma after the competition completes, from the Internet. "A log does not have to be sent in. The data to create the certificates is generated from the log books of the WRTC stations." explained Hajo.

The "WRTC Sprint" diploma is appealing for determined diploma hunters, because it is all about speed. Those who contact all 63 WRTC stations (regardless of operating mode or band) within a short period of time will be honoured with a certificate. The award also takes into account the 29 different WRTC qualifying regions across North and South America, Oceania, Africa, Asia and Europe. The leader in each region will receive a special prize in addition to the certificate.

Those YL's and OM's that contact the WRTC stations on all bands and modes, should aim for the "WRTC Most QSOs (MQ)" diploma to add to their collection. The maximum number of contacts for all WRTC stations on CW and SSB across all five amateur contest bands would be 630. Will anyone reach

that? Here too, a separate classification is made under the 29 WRTC regions. The regional winners will each receive a special prize.

The WRTC 2018 Distance Challenge is about contacts over as many kilometres as possible when making up to the maximum possible 630 contacts with the WRTC teams. This special price is attractive to those who can show the most kilometres from the logbook ", reports Michael Höding.

All contacts of the WRTC teams will be verified by the referees. as in many sports, the WRTC referees rely on assistance. The most assistance provided to WRTC referees comes from the logbooks of amateurs that contact the WRTC teams and are received by 18:00 UTC on Sunday, July 15. The amateurs submitting these check-logs will all go into a draw for the "Assistant Judge" prize.

(mhw) When you looking for WRTC 2018 in Dayton you will find a probably unmanned booth. In 2018 all our work is focused on the finale preparation for the big event in July 2018. Therefore only a small delegation visit Dayton this year. You will find Chris, DL1MGB, in Crown Plaza in the Contest Super Suite. You can ask him everything. Chris has also the honor to be the dinner speaker during the annual contest dinner on Saturday evening.

## On the way to the real-time scoreboard

Published: 29 May 2018

Wittenberg. (xv) How's the competition going? Who is ahead? Where is a particular team? Answers to these questions interest competitors and spectators alike, in every sport - including radio sports. It's about speed not only with the operators at the WRTC stations but also with results reporting. Online presentation of the current score requires a lot of technical effort behind the scenes! Ben Büttner, DL6RAI, who leads the responsible IT team at WRTC 2018, says: "We want to make sure that from all competition locations, the on-going results in minute intervals are available on a scoreboard similar to a Football league table and at the same on the Internet published on www.wrtc2018.de. "In order for this to work, special attention is attached to unwanted RF radiation, thermal stability and redundant power when we build the Score Collection Computers (SCC). An important goal is that there should be no disruption during the competition."

The SCCs, which are built on a RaspberryPi base, collect the information required for the presentation of the results from the relevant logbook software at each site and transfer this data via the mobile phone network to a central server. From the results gathered there, the current position table is created and made visible on the Internet for everyone. "We finished building the SCCs over the Whitsun weekend" says Ben, DL6RAI. "Parts for 55 SCCs were assembled to make a total along with the existing 15 machines of 70 devices as required for the WRTC" Ben said.

The idea of a current scores table is not new. The scoreboards were already available in 2002 "online", but only current on an hourly basis. At that time, the referees sent messages via SMS, which were then published to the Internet. At the time it was extraordinary and a novelty. At WRTC 2014 in

Boston, Bob Raymond, WA1Z and Dave Pascoe, KM3T, developed the SCC concept. When used in 2014, however, it became clear that not all locations could be reliably reached via the local mobile phone network.

Incidentally, a scoreboard for contest participants is not a new idea from the WRTC.

The web site www.cqcontest.net offers up-to-the-minute results tables for all major contests. Many contesters are already taking part. Integration takes place via the Internet. "The scoreboard at cqcontest.net is a great facility" says Michael Höding, DL6MHW, responsible for public relations at WRTC 2018. "You can watch the top people driving each other during the contest. This scoreboard is also interesting and useful for normal radio ops as often there are competitors with similar station capabilities to the normal Op. This is fun and transforms the contest into a new kind of direct head-to-head competition. It's like being in the last third of a half-marathon and you want to catch up with the sportsman in the blue shorts ahead of you" comments Michael Höding, DL6MHW.









## No Signs of Interference – all sites are well suited

Published: 30 May 2018

Wittenberg (xv) After the final check all sites for WRTC 2018 are confirmed now. The checks proved that all sites are well suited with respect to topographical and interference problems. This is the result that Ulrich Weiss (DJ2YA) and Frank Neumann (DM5WF) arrived at after carefully inspecting more than 80 possible WRTC 2018 sites in the areas round Muehlberg, Jessen and Jueterbog. Ulrich Weiss stated: "When measuring the angles to the horizon in all directions with a theodolite we didn't

detect a single elevation of more than 1° among the occasional enhancements at the horizon. Furthermore, we paid special attention to make sure that the Fresnel Zones round the antenna locations are plain and free of obstructions. And Frank Neumann added "Five of the intended sites did not meet the criteria, however, it is no problem to replace them from the stock of back-up sites that we inspected as well. Our particular concern were the directions towards North America with its great number of potential DX-contacts". The evaluation team was supported by Andreas Thron (DL8UAT), Wolfgang Tretschock (DL2RSF) and Andreas Winter (DK4WA).



Apart from the evaluation of the topography, all sites were checked for interfering influences by high voltage power lines, wind energy plants or railway lines. With an IC7300 and an active antenna (specially designed by Joerg Logemann, DL2NI, for noise floor measurements) all sites were carefully checked for any kind of interfering noise, for instance from the few power lines in a distance of at least 500m.

"Doing these checks in temperatures of well over 90° Fahrenheit were quite a feat", Ulrich Weiss pointed out and continued, "and occasional bye-passers shook their heads when observing a car with a strange number plate and an unusual contraption mounted on its roof on our off-road exercises. Each site has a distance of at least 1000m to the nearest neighbor and driving to them all took us more than 600km during these 3 days."

These activities show impressively how much space (and effort) is required and what challenge it is for the organizing team to provide a "level playing field" for all competitors. The glacial plains between the towns of Wittenberg, Jessen, Muehlberg and Jueterbog help to set the stage for fair contesting between competitors from all over the world. The great event is just 40 days ahead now.

## Without 1300 broom handles it can't happen!

Wittenberg (xv) Almost casually, Robby Pöschk, DM6DX, mentioned in our latest teleconference: "We have the 1300 broom handles and the more than 30 Kilometres of barrier tape along with the more than 65 Dixie portaloos in supplies." That caused some frivolity between the organizers of the WRTC 2018 and some disbelief. Surprised at the 1300 broom handles, the press spokesman asked why so many were needed. "Without air hooks, I can not secure the operators area in the sites," was the answer of the logistics officer Robby Pöschk.



The simple fence is the combination of 20 broom handles each and 500 m of red & white barrier tape to surround the antennas and the station tents at the 65 locations. This avoids anyone tripping over the guy wires, having access to the antennas and tent and possibly causing damage. It still seems unusual though. Who would have thought of broom handles being required for the amateur radio world championship!

The need for toilets is clearly recognizable. The fact that behind the mere ordering of blue lavatories there also lies logistical effort is much easier to explain. The toilets must be set up punctually at the 65 site locations and picked up quickly after the end of the contest.

Robby, DM6DX, talks about WRTC's small and big challenges in logistics: "There are 130 tables, lamps, fans and 198 chairs that are not available at the furniture store around the corner. So we had to order the lamps for the stations directly from the manufacturer."

Listening to the regularly scheduled teleconferences in the areas of organization, Internet technology and public relations, quickly reveals the immense effort involved behind the scenes for the WRTC. There is the logistical component, with all its facets of acquiring and transferring material such as antennas, masts, generators and station tents. The accommodation and transport of guests, referees and volunteers to finding parking spaces in the Lutherstadt Wittenberg. There are intensive discussions with local authorities in Wittenberg and Jessen. In the organizational teleconferences points are reported, discussed, agreed and arrangements made.

But these aspects are just a few examples that are taken out of the whole context. In the technical area the IT teleconferences move up a level and those without IT knowledge understand nothing. Last of all, how the WRTC is portrayed to the public through words, pictures and films, and which news reports should be released is covered on the agenda and in the discussions of the PR team teleconference.

For every organizational group in the WRTC 2018, the clock is running and the countdown continues unimpeded to the start of the World Championship. It has a motivating effect on the organizers, the "To Do" lists show not only open actions but also many entries marked as "done". "As this continues, I'm sure that the countdown generates a very positive adrenaline rush and more and more excitement for what is coming," said Chris Janßen, DL1MGB, President WRTC 2018 eV, Sure, because it is now only 45 days until the start of the first ever WRTC in Germany.

Also encouraging was the interest of the many volunteer helpers who gathered at the WRTC stand to discuss and clarify final questions about the technology in use and general organization. Manfred Wolf DJ5MW, a participant from the 2014 World Championships was available at the WRTC stand to answer all visitors' questions. Concurrently the organizing team used the Hamfest weekend to clarify organizational details. The World Championship for radio amateurs starts in just 35 days!

## All sites will be equal right down to the detailed level.

Published: 12 June 2018

Wittenberg. (xv) At the World Championship, ensuring all competing teams have the same operational conditions is of core importance. This does not only apply to topographical conditions, which have recently been verified in detail. This also applies to the antennas. It's not good enough just to build the same type of antennas and get them "somewhere around" resonance. In order to create the same conditions for all competitor's great importance was placed on the accuracy of the measuring equipment to be used in this area.

At WRTC 2018, the antenna construction teams will all use standardized antenna analyzers provided by RigExpert. RigExpert has produced the antenna analyzer AA-35 Zoom in a "special edition" for the WRTC 2018. The analyzer has more storage than the standard device. This is necessary to allow the comparative measurement of multiple team-built antenna systems. The AA-35 Zoom analyzer was selected because its +13 dBm output power ensures stable measurements. This is the only way we can guarantee during construction that all antenna systems are the same. The Nanuk hard case provides optimal protection of the valuable device even in rough usage areas.



#### VA2EW will be the teamleader of the new wildcard team #6

## With 300kW from Wittenberg via Vienna to North America

Wittenberg. (xv) The WRTC is to be covered in two special broadcasts by Radio DARC. The radio show of the German Amateur Radio Club e.V. will broadcast a program in English on Saturday, July 14 from 11.00 to 12.00 UTC using the 49m short-wave band on 6070 kHz. Especially for the many people interested in WRTC from North America, the program will also be broadcast on 13860 kHz at the same time. The 6-hour time difference makes it possible for the show to serve as a "breakfast radio" WRTC News on the East Coast of North America. There is expected to be a high level of interest from North America as not only did a total of 14 teams from North America qualify but also the defending champions Daniel Craig (N6MJ) and Chris Hurlbut (KL9A) are from the USA.

A day later, on Sunday the 15th. the second broadcast will be sent at 9:00 am UTC. In both broadcasts, which can be received all over Europe as well as in North America, will, as well as covering the region and people in the Wittenberg and Jessen areas will also include content from journalists reporting on current WRTC event. What the World Championship is all about and how it works will be presented. Behind the scenes reports will cover the qualifying process, the competitors and their four-year preparation as well as the efforts of all the volunteers in this mammoth project. The contest rules and award programs will be explained. Tips will be given on technology in use to make those DX contacts and the all-important radio propagation report completes the "WRTC-special" program.



The transmitters which can reach 300,000 listeners in many parts of the world, are located in Vienna, Austria. The Radio DARC program regularly airs on Sundays at 9:00 am UTC on 6070 kHz in the 49m band and covers current news from the amateur radio and short-wave sectors, equipment reports, technology tips and interviews along with varied music. Radio DARC is unique in its magazine format worldwide and now is the last remaining long, medium or short-wave broadcast show that is voluntarily produced in Germany by radio amateurs.

## The WRTC 2018 - a family event

## Everything needs to be boxed!

Wittenberg. (Xv) The cross-cut saw screams, the cordless drills whir, wood panels are put together and the correct screws are sought out. There is a busy workshop buzz in the WRTC logistics center. Some time ago, Peter Spies, DB6JG, from Weeze started the work using a CNC machine to cut chipboard into parts for the "WRTC boxes". Last weekend, a group of 20 people met to complete 65 of these transport cases.

The boxes are tailored to the transport vans that will take the equipment out to the 65 locations. "Everything that is needed on the site, including antenna materials arrives packed in the box. Only the mast is transported separately, "reports Andreas" Paul "Paulick, DL5CW. This ensures that nothing gets lost in transit in the vehicles. The mast, antenna, tent and generator accessories are

bulky enough, but small items tend to disappear in voluminous vans, as most amateurs know from their yearly Fieldday events. Based on this experience, it seemed the obvious choice to have suitable containers for the WRTC equipment and so control the "escape tendancies" of small items such as screws, plugs & the like. In addition to this wood workshop, the last antenna work was carried out. Sixty five rotators are now bolted to their base plates and tested that they're working correctly.



The guying sets for the masts are also complete. If twenty men work hard they get hungry - but hunger had no chance thanks to the support from Renate Radwan. Paul, DL5CW, commented: "Renate deserves a lot of praise and a thank-you because it is she, who provided us with first-class food service at all our previous sessions in the logistics center!" Another busy weekend for the logistics team is behind them. While the suitcases are packed by the competition participants, the 65 "WRTC boxes" will soon be ready. In 19 days the first German WRTC will be opened. The travel nerves of the contestants and the anticipation of the volunteers and organizers are increasing by the day.





## Equipped with 70 mobile phones for emergencies

Wittenberg. (xv) What are 70 phones needed for, when radio and antennas around the globe are used? "For emergencies and to coordinate in emergency situations, it was absolutely essential to equip the organizational center in Wittenberg with standard, easy-to-use telephones and not smart phones," explains Michael Höding (DL6MHW) from the board of the WRTC 2018 eV "At each location the referee is allocated one of these telephones. This allows him to communicate with the central office if, for example, problems with the competition need to be addressed, "continues Michael Höding.



In addition to these communication paths, the radio amateurs have set up yet another backup: Three repeaters in the 70cm band are connected together to form a network, which considerably increases the range of the radio signals. If one of the repeaters is accessed, the two other connected repeaters also transmit the message. Thus, the transmissions can be heard in the entire area between Wittenberg, Jessen, Jüterbog and Mühlberg / Elbe. This facilitates organizational processes and can be a valuable fall-back in emergencies.

The installation of the 70 basic phones also creates considerable work in this part of the overall organization. "Every phone has to be charged, the SIM card installed, and it activated. In addition, we have set up special telephone numbers for the equipment, such as the number of the WRTC hotline or the SMS server, "explains Ben Büttner (DL6RAI), who performed this complex work with Luise Ostheimer (DL2MLU) last weekend. All phones were tested with their prepaid SIM cards and everything worked straight away.

The interim scores of the competition teams are transmitted via a special computer to the scoreboard server in Wittenberg every minute to be displayed there on a large display. However, should this connection fail, the referee can send by SMS, the current score to Wittenberg and this will keep the scoreboard up to date, not on at minute intervals but at least on a regularly basis.

It is just 15 days until the amateur radio world championship starts for the first time in Germany. The last World Cup took place in 2014 in Boston / USA.

## Mayor Hannelore Brendel supports the WRTC

Mühlberg / Elbe. (xv) With respect to our world championship, the World Radiosport Team Championship -short WRTC-, organizers require that the communities in which the 65 competition stations are to be set up, be fully informed. "In addition to general information, what the World Championship in amateur radio is all about, discussion of regulatory authority aspects is also required," said Frank Neumann (DM5WF), who travelled to Mühlberg / Elbe, to visit the local government office to check the status of the planned locations and to report on progress. Mühlberg's mayor Hannelore Brendel did not miss the chance to wish the World Championship good luck.

She'll be keeping her fingers crossed for all the teams and maybe the winning team will be one of those transmitting from a site in the Mühlberg on the Elbe area? Frank Neumann has been travelling a lot in the past days and weeks to inform the authorities about the amateur radio world championship. He has also completed all the necessary arrangements with the owners of the sites on which the radio stations will be built for the competition weekend. The 24-hour competition for the world's best "contest team" starts on the 14th of July at 14.00. More than 300 volunteers are

deployed to build 65 remote stations. Competition teams from 31 nations are due to arrive. Two radio amateurs form each of the competition teams at the radio station sites. The total of 126 competitors had to qualify between 2014 and 2018 taking part in 32 competitions for the World Championship. Among them are three German teams. For the first time, the World Championship will take place in Germany. In 2014, the last WRTC was in Boston / USA. The organization is in full swing - just 12 days to the opening of the World Championships in Wittenberg.



## Interview with Xenia Berger from New Zealand and Mathias Acevedo from Chile

While preparing for the WRTC2018 we thought, that it would be a good idea to talk with younger participants about ham radio and about the WRTC in Germany. Today we focus on Xenia Berger, ZL4YL and Mathias Acevedo, CE2LR.

First of all, many thanks to both of you, for finding some time for the Interview. We all know, that you have lots of things to do.



Now our questions:

#### 1. How did you discover Ham Radio?

Xenia: My dad introduced me to it, he himself having discovered the hobby when he was about 16. He wanted all of his family to have a license as well and now we all do! (except for our cat). Getting a radio license was just an expected part of growing up in our family.

Mathias: Well this is in the year 2010, when I belonged to a youth brigade of firefighters in the community of La Calera, in which I was familiar with the VHF equipment that we used. After a while I retired but I was still with my VHF team and one day I visited a radio ham who programmed us the teams radios in the fire company and I spoke at a radio exhibition in the center of the city that I attended. There I found the members of the radio club team (CE2RCF) that had some antennas and were transmitting throughout the country and some neighboring countries. What caught my attention immediately, so I enrolled in the club to be a member and get my radio ham license. After several activities with the club I knew the following areas of the hobby, dx, contests, etc.

#### 2. What fascinated you about Ham Radio and what do you like most in Ham Radio?

Xenia: I read a lot and whenever I read apocalypse-like books they always tried to find ham radio operators to communicate. It was always the hams who played a critical part in the survival of the protagonist. As well as in the 1931 Napier earthquake, it was radio amateurs who contacted the Victoria (a navy ship) to come and help, which meant so many more people survived. I just like the fact that Ham radio isn't just a hobby, it's a critical part of emergency operations.

Mathias: Well after seeing what the DX was, my father got me a 10M tower on which I installed a 5m yagi for 28Mhz, with which I contacted everyone and an old TS-440S. After a while I met Roberto (CE3CT) who very kindly invited me to come one day to know his station. When it came to me - that was a dream, you will see giant towers with monobanders, last generation amplifiers, etc. At the same time, he invited me to my first ARRL 10M (2013) contest, which was my first time in a contest with a high-end team - CE3FZ, CE3CT and CE2MVF. CE3FZ my first moments seeing in action an OP of CW. At that time I began to be interested in trying to learn CW, in 2014 achieving this important goal in my career as a dx-ist and contester, to understand the morse code. After Roberto joined the group of contestants of CE3CT I know Dale VE7SV who is a HAM known worldwide, and with the unconditional support of CE3CT, VE7SV, CE2ML, CE3OP and some radio amateurs of the country and got the successes that I have.

#### 3. What is your main emphasis in Ham Radio?

Xenia: My main interest in ham radio is definitely contesting, as well as DXing although not as much. Rag chewing has never been my favourite thing (in radio or real life). I enjoy the competition aspect of it, as well as setting NZ or sometimes even Oceania records, hence I'm thoroughly looking forward to the WRTC.

Mathias: Well what I focus more on in the hobby, is to improve my skills as a contest operator every day and try and motivate more hams to be part of the contests and dxes

## 4. How was the "qualification-marathon" and have there been any interesting experiences along the way?

Xenia: The qualification marathon didn't affect me that much, only in the way that I spent less time on the radio for the big contests as of course dad had to compete in them in order to qualify. The problem was that because of the time difference, most of the contests don't end until 1pm Monday, which meant dad had to continuously take days off, which therefore reduced our holiday time in the year.

Mathias: Well this starts in 2016 when I already know CW and seeing good qualities as OP, Roberto tells me that I can use his station as an OP monkey, which leads me to a climb within the top 5 scores of the SA 2 cube. Always trying to reach the first place, something difficult since the only real competition was 2016 and 2017, and being ranked No. 3 in the classification of SA 2 in 2017. I had the opportunity to attend Dayton hamvention, make many friends. Also it was an explosion of experiences, knowledge, making friends, visiting some stations like K9CT, WB9Z and the luck of being able to operate from NR4M in the CQWPXCW that year. I learnt more about the WRTC that was approaching, K0MD who motivated me as a youth team, which interested me a lot. After a few months the applications for the youth team were opened, I asked Bryant KG5HVO who I had met in Dayton if he wanted to be my partner for this event if we classified. When on October 1 in my email I see a message from the organization of WRTC 2018, in the qualify I see that we are the # 1 ranked youth team! The happiness was remarkable of my teacher and mine that we would be part of one of the most important events of the ham radios worldwide.

#### 5. How do you prepare yourself for the WRTC technically, physically and mentally?

Xenia: Last year I did a lot of the big contests as a single op to get used to being on the radio for long periods of time. Because of bad conditions, we don't really get many pileups so we train using a programme called morse runner.

Mathias: Well I have been preparing every day using morserunner, participating in all the contests that I have, studying some records of past IARU 2017, to know the propagation schedules, bands, etc. I also made a trip to the USA to prepare all our staff for the contest and the exercise with my partner in the CQWPX CW 2017 using a set-up similar to the one to be used in Germany.

#### 6. What are your expectations and goals for the WRTC and what are you looking forward to?

Xenia: My hope is that we don't come last;) and that we don't get unlucky with any equipment failure or otherwise. I just hope we have a good time – that we don't forget to actually enjoy the competition! I'm looking forward to meeting all those amazing contesters, many of whom I've worked on the bands.

Mathias: Good as expectations, gain experience, knowledge of the best operators, everything that helps me improve my OP skills, also be able to share with people, as well as yourself that we share in this beautiful hobby.

Xenia: Wednesday the 11th of July

Mathias: Tuesday the 10th of July

We are very grateful for you taking the time to answer our questions. To you both and to your teams of course, good luck in the WRTC 2018! We'll see you soon!

#### What's your opinion of how this very special World Championship in Jessen is perceived?

Daniel Lehmann: First of all, I am especially happy for our city, that such an event will take place here and that Jessen (Elster) can be the host. Top radio operators from all over the world will be here to pursue their passion.

A big thank you goes to the many volunteers. Without their commitment such an event would not be possible.

The current perception for the event is reserved. With only a few local people interested, however Jessen enjoys an international reputation with its radio stations for those in the know. After the World Championship and the associated media coverage this will certainly change.

I wish the event itself a smooth execution with exciting and fair competition. I wish all participants good luck. The helpers and their accompanying families, friends and fans should have fun at the World Championship and around our region.

#### What did you think personally when the concerns of the radio amateurs were presented to you?

Daniel Lehmann: I was excited about this event with its German and worldwide significance. After the track dog world championship in 2004 it's good to have such a high-ranking event take place in our region again. Great!

# Have you had any contact with amateur radio previously, either privately or in a professional context, for example in civil defence roles?

Daniel Lehmann: Yes, as a child, with so-called walkie talkies. If I can link such things with amateur radio, but using radios to connect in any case.

Fortunately, we did not have to resort to emergency radio during the flood disasters from the Elbe and Schwarzer Elster rivers. I know however that during other major disasters, amateur radio was called in to help. When this happens we know we can rely upon the skills and infrastructure provided by the amateur radio operators.

As part of my job, I have to deal with radio - naturally. In my function as director of the municipal public order office, I am familiar with the topic "radio", as 905 comrades in our volunteer fire departments, including 583 in active service, have to communicate and use them in case of emergency. The city of Jessen (Elster) being responsible for fire protection has to procure and maintain the necessary infrastructure for this purpose.

We have also been part of the large-scale project to switch from analogue to digital radio communications for our 27 active municipal local aid services.

One of the "Amateur Radio Pioneers" from the Jessen area - Mr. Oskar Radwan - often advised and supported us with his expertise.

Yes, Oskar Radwan (DL3OF) and his wife Renate, are also very involved in the World Championship and both help the entire organizing team in many ways. Back to the World Championship: The World Championship takes place for the first time in Germany. Jessen is at the center of the activities. What do you think?

Daniel Lehmann: Along with others Andreas Winter from the DARC Jessen-Herzberg club, was involved in bringing the World Championship to Germany for the first time. That the championship is now to be held in the Jessen area, I am pleased all the more. The region will present itself from its best side for the event. Of course, it should not go unmentioned that Jessen is a stronghold of radio sport and the members of the local radio club have won the German Short wave Cup several times.

It's nice to hear that Andreas Winter (DK4WA), is in constant contact with you. While Andreas Winter also plays as site manager a major role in the organization team of the World Championship this is to be expected. How do you perceive the organizational preparations for the World Championship?

Daniel Lehmann: Absolutely smooth, dedicated people with a very professional manner. All previous contacts were consistently positive and friendly.

# All of the farms used for radio stations and their antennas have given space at no cost. What do you think about that?

Daniel Lehmann: For me, this is another example of the great hospitality that exists in our region. When it comes down to it one simply helps each other in an uncomplicated way. The "Jessener" are simply a helpful people.

#### Antennas at Luther Hotel

Wittenberg. (xv) It is now also apparent from the outside that the Luther Hotel has become the hotspot for radio sport - the World Radiosport Team Championship WRTC while over the last couple of days, Ulf Ehrlich (DL5AXX) and Michael Höding (DL6MHW) have mounted the first antennas on the roof of the hotel. Initially, a Butternut HF6V and a FD4 have been installed. This allows the HQ station to be operational on all contest bands. The comparatively simple antennas will allow numerous WRTC contacts because of the short distance to the competitors sites.



The participants also have an opportunity to complete their last training sessions before the competition. the station also creates a good way to test the current propagation conditions. Furthermore, the station at the Luther Hotel allows the organizers to listen-in during the IARU contest at the weekend. This will indicate how the competition is running and how the pile-up's are going. Of course, the organizers and helpers left behind at the hotel will also have the opportunity to participate in the contest that starts on Saturday at 2 pm and to give points to the competitors, because every contact counts.

The hotel hosts most of the participants and referees during the WRTC week. From here, the event is controlled and organized. The organizing team headed by the President of WRTC 2018 e.V., Christian Janßen (DL1MGB) and his Second in Command, Michael Höding (DL6MHW), are in constant contact with the site managers, the referees and the logistics center. "For this purpose, an extensive communication structure is being set up at the moment, which has been prepared and tested in recent months. This includes setting up the score board, which is important for the competitors, "explains Chris Janßen." At the hotel, it is displayed on monitors and updated every minute on the internet showing who is in the lead during the competition." "Whether the teams in the lead at the end also win the contest will only be known after the detailed evaluation of all logs by the competition judges," adds Michael Höding. The judging team, which is also based in the headquarters hotel, has its hands full after 2pm on Sunday. Who the actual winning team is, will only be clear on Monday (16 July). The award ceremony takes place on Monday evening. After that the first ever World Radio Championship in Germany ends and from the headquarters out the large cleaning and packing up work starts.



Direct communication in the central office provides quick solutions to many problems. The equipment there includes a multifunction printer, computer for weather observation, our own computer network and well-filled whiteboards which are used intensively.



Ulf DL5AXX turns on all 65 clocks and waits for the RF synchronisation with the time standards transmitter in Frankfurt to take place.



A telephone hotline with three phones is ready to answer requests from the helpers which can be fed into a ticket system directly. From Tuesday, the activity will increase again. Those working in the control centre, work under a shift system. In two daily meetings, the subject area managers present their reports, so that the organisation has the best chance of making the WRTC a success.

# Radio amateurs provide technical progress and promote global understanding

A few days before the start of the amateur radio world championship, we had the opportunity to interview the mayor of Wittenberg, Jochen Kirchner.

Wittenberg will become in the next few days, the centre of organization for the amateur radio world championship and the location for especially important events such as the opening and award ceremonies. Many guests will get to know the "Lutherstadt" whether they are from Germany or abroad. What can you say about how this very special World Championship is perceived by the Wittenberg locals?

After the Reformation anniversary, this has become a unique year for our "Lutherstadt" leaving many memories. As the "smallest city in the world" Wittenberg see no end to its role of welcoming the world and providing a colourful place for rhetoric. A time of dialogue that now experiences a seamless continuation into the world radio championship. With the Wittenberg University of Leucorea and its famous sons, the city has an impressive academic legacy. Wilhelm Weber, born in our city and the inventor of electric telegraphy, is the inspiration for today's radio sport. There can be no better connection! That's why I am very happy that this major international event is taking place in Lutherstadt Wittenberg. Our Wittenberg locals are not only excellent hosts, but also very active and technically minded.

#### What did you personally think when the concerns of the radio amateurs were presented to you?

Professionalism. It demonstrates that volunteering knows no boundaries. To understand oneself, words are not always needed rather a connection. As radio operators you are not only pioneers of progress, but also pioneers of unlimited global communications. In a time of fake news, hostility and abusive vocabulary, the short-wave community makes a decisive contribution to international friendship. It's great that this unique sport fights against radio silence and brings people closer together.

# Did you already have points of contact to amateur radio privately or in your official business roles e.g. in civil defence?

Major events do not only require the support of many people. Equally important is that all parties communicate in the same way. With the use of digital radio by all of the security teams present for the Reformation anniversary, this technology proved its worth. We are happy that the use of digital radio ensured smooth processes and contributed to the safety of all visitors.

# For the first time this World Championship takes place in Germany. Wittenberg is the organizational centre of the event. How do you feel about that?

World Championships inspire the whole family. This is not only testified to by the current World Soccer Cup. Parents and their children have formed joint teams for the Radio World-Cup. A great community effort! In addition to the technical pioneering spirit, the excellent environment, both from topographical and high-frequency propagation viewpoint, Lutherstadt Wittenberg provides an ideal venue for the World Championship. No ground elevations are above 1° and with no interference from power lines or wind turbines optimum competition conditions are guaranteed. Surrounded by the Middle Elbe biosphere park lands and the Fläming area, the Lutherstadt also offers the best possibilities for a travel break.

#### How do you perceive the organizational preparations for the World Championship?

From the beginning it was important to respond to fears, reservations and questions with clear statements. A learning experience that applies to events and to the future design of Lutherstadt as a whole. A good concept comes to life only with cooperation and transparency. Already in 2015, the local organizers informed us about their large project. In close co-operation several meetings were held to examine the grounds needed for the competition sites. From the beginning, the preparations for the World Championship have been characterised by a reliable and trustful cooperation. Experienced organizers from all over Germany have ensured that a professional and at the same time unique, world championship will take place in our region. I wish the organizing team good luck with the final preparations!

# Many farmers have provided space free for the radio stations and their antennas. How do you rate that?

It is an impressive situation and makes me very happy. At the same time, it is proven that great things can develop through the networking of mainstream and voluntary organizations. It is a benefit for our Lutherstadt and the whole region.

#### Contestants training

The WRTC is a serious event. On Thursday morning, participants and referees for the radio sports world championship had to get up early for a very important meeting at 8 am! During the briefing by the competition management all rule principles were again explained, and all questions answered. Moderator Uwe, DL8OBF, was supported by the Judging Committee. Led by Ulf, DL5AXX, the Judging Committee contains experienced contest experts from four continents. Randy, K5ZD, has a lot of experience as organizer of WRTC 2014, Nodir, EY8MM was a member of the Judging committee in 2014 and Bernd, VK2IA, was referee in 2014 and multiple times a WRTC participant. Dietmar, DL3DXX, organizes the log check team and has developed special evaluation software.



Competitors and referees asked for a lot of detail. Especially as regards correct log keeping and rating of QSOs, such as what to do when the QSO partner sent the wrong zone. The guidelines given at the meeting are a building block for fair competition, which must indeed be reflected during contest operation and not only through subsequent regulatory discussions.

In another meeting there was a detailed briefing for the referees. Here, among other things, the function of the power checking meter was described, and the configuration of the score collection computer explained.

#### WRTC opening event

The event was framed by a parade of participants from 40 nations and an entertaining report by John Dorr, K1AR, the first team champion of a WRTC event in 1990 in Seattle. All participants, visitors and supporters alike are looking forward to an eventful and competitive event.



# Drawing of the Y8xx call signs and site locations

Friday morning had an exciting and important event in the program. Although all locations are equivalent, the draw of locations and callsigns is considered to be the fairest method of allocating the sites. A glass bowl containing 63 plastic orbs containing the call signs of the teams and the assigned referee along with sealed envelopes with the Y8xx call sign inside laid on the table.



The first team was Manfred, DJ5MW and Stefan, DL1IAO, who will transmit from the location near Mühlberg, the furthest away from the HQ. Also Stephane, F4DXW and Sebastian, F8CMF could start early with the help of the volunteers. Two and a half hours later Fred, K9VV and John, VE3EJ received the nearest location, almost directly on the Elbe.

The sealed envelopes will be held by the referees and will only be opened at 11.45 UTC tomorrow, 15 minutes before the competition starts.

## Working the Y8xx Call signs and Collecting activity awards

It starts Tomorrow! This is going to be GREAT.

The call signs from the Y8 call sign block will be assigned to 63 teams and will sure help to generate massive pile ups on the bands on 10 m to 80 m. You can work the Y8xx in CW as well in SSB.

Martin, DL4NAC, has kindly written out some guidance notes of how to best work the stations.

Important information for chasing the WRTC stations:

- WRTC stations will work only operate on the 80 to 10m contest bands using CW and SSB
- WRTC stations should be spotted by callers in the DX clusters
- Please treat all WRTC stations the same don't favorize one over another
- Do not be surprised that everyone speaks English only and won't give their own call sign out (that's in the rules).
- Make sure that the QSO is as short as possible.
- Keep trying difficult band, as the WRTC stations will only be running 100 W and will not be loud.
- Try looking for the stations early on Sunday morning on 80 and 40m as it's likely the station will only be the higher bands on Saturday.
- Your help can be rewarded there are diplomas and medals to apply for.

The award series includes 5 certificates,

- WAWRTC Worked All WRTC Stations
- WRTC Sprint contact all stations in the shortest time
- WRTC Most QSOs who makes the largest number of contacts with the WRTC stations
- Assistant Judge for those submitting check logs
- Long Distance Challenge for those with contacts from the furthest distance sum

# Today on the Short Waves

Published: 14 July 2018

Breakfast radio with 300kW plus 20dB gain towards North America

The WRTC is started and today RADIO DARC will transmit a special broadcast. The broadcast will be in English from 11:00 to 12:00 UTC (13:00 to 14:00 CEST) in the 49 m band at 6070 kHz and at the same time in the 22m band at 13 860 kHz.

The six-hour time difference makes it possible for RADIO DARC program to serve up-to-date World Championship news to North America's radio amateurs as a "breakfast radio" show. In order to reach

North America a 300 kW transmitter and a 20 dB gain directional antenna will be used from the broadcasting center near Vienna. The contest starts today at 12.00 UTC.

## Happy Contesters - Happy Volunteers - the sun is shining!

The mood ahead of the start of the WRTC in Wittenberg is great. The Contesters are up-beat and happy about their beautiful sites and super-volunteers they met on Friday.

# cq contest cq contest ... Bands are full - mood very good

The contest has been running for some hours now and the competitors are wrestling each other for points. The bands are "very busy" and finding a free frequency is exhausting. The fight for the top place is exciting, also for the spectators, they watch the score of the teams changes every minute on the score board. The table with the current score (scoreboard) can also be found on the Internet at www.WRTC2018.de.





We visited some of the teams about an hour before the start of the contest and the atmosphere was quite outstanding despite the understandable tension of the Contester. The talented volunteers had installed the station infrastructure in advance. "Some drops of sweat flowed, but it was worth it, because we have a lot of fun - despite the strenuous work," said one of the helpers rather casually. "We have great volunteers, we've found a perfect site," remarks Mindis, LY4L.

### WRTC 2018 - Update (2)

Published: 15 July 2018

WRTC 2018 - the night is over. It was cool and starry. The OPs in the tents were busy. Now the sun is rising. The best teams have almost 4000 QSOs in the log. At the top are consistently LY9A / LY4L - with some distance followed by DJ5MW / DL1IAO. The WRTC 2018 is still running for 8 hours. Call all Y8 stations!







# Excitement right up to the end

Published: 15 July 2018

There are still a few hours left to push the current leading team from Lithuania, who has had the lead for many hours, sitting in first place on the scoreboard. Gedas Lucinskas, LY9A, and Mindis Jukna, LY4L, led the way in the first few hours of the contest, while the German team of Manfred Wolf, DJ5MW and Stefan von Baltz, DL1IAO, have been steadily progressing up from their initial position, midfield. Now, in the morning, both teams are separated by around 300,000 points from each other; this sounds a lot at first. But that can change. Will the equipment continue working? Will the concentration and fitness of the competitors be enough? The night was tiring with thousands of contacts and no team can afford to take a break if they are to have a chance of the World Championship title. It will remain exciting right up until the last minute. The excitement of the competitors is at least as high as that from the spectators watching the Scoreboard. But what distinguishes viewers from contesters is that the spectators can see the current position of all of the stations, the contest teams do not know, as they are not allowed a connection to the Internet. So the

spectators watching the scoreboard up until the end of the contest know who the likely winner may be - so more than the contesters themselves. Whether, however, the places on the scoreboard become official can only happen after full log checking has taken place. This stage can only begin when the USB sticks with the data from the logging computers handed over by the referees in the HQ organization center. The log checkers are ready and waiting to get started. The winner will be announced tomorrow (Monday) evening.



# The end of the competition - there is silence on the bands - the log checkers have the floor.

Published: 15 July 2018

Did the team from Lithuania really win it? With more than 5.9 million points Gedas, LY9A, and Mindis, LY4L, are clearly ahead of the German team of Manfred, DJ5MW, and Stefan, DL1IAO. The Germans managed 5.3 million points. Whether the scores stay as they are is not yet certain, first all logs need to be checked. The work of the Log Checkers now starts. The memory keys with the contact logs on them are supplied to the log checking team. With the phrase "CQ contest, Y81N, CQ Test de Y81N" the Lithuanian team managed 5212 radio contacts. By the contest end, the German team achieved 4874 contacts.



Which teams get the lower places is open as the point differences between third to sixth places are very small. At the moment, the 2014 gold medalists from the USA are in third place, followed by teams from Slovenia, The Ukraine and Bulgaria. Whoever occupies the places in the end and if there is a change to the positions of the leading teams remains to be seen.

How many points remain after evaluation for each team is now in the hands of the checkers who will check everything very precisely.

Those who followed the scoreboard realized how quickly the positions of the teams changed.

What was interesting and exciting for the spectators was hidden from the competition teams, because in the rules of the competition accepted by the stations bans external access through smartphone, internet and more. Even the referee has only a simple telephone for use in emergencies or for questions to the organizers and judges. Therefore, the surprise was set for the competition end after 2:00 pm: Where did we finish up and where our competitors? Exhaustion and relief are written equally on the team's faces. After 24 hours of maximum concentration on the radio, relaxation and recovery are now essential. But not every team will succeed relaxing immediately as the adrenalin level is only gradually decreasing. Not everyone will be able to sleep straight away.

It is probably a mixture of feelings of happiness, the joy of what has been achieved and finally "having it over with", which is prevalent among all 63 teams and equally important, the 63 referees.

### Reserved happiness among the Lithuanians

Observations at site ABG-3

Sunday, 2:00 pm, contest end. Deep breathes from the three in the tent at Site ABG-3. 24 hours work is behind them. Referee Michael Fulcher, KC7V, comes out of the tent, talks to us briefly and asks that we from the media team be patient. "Of course - we will comply," I reply in broken English before he closes the tent door with the zipper again. Meanwhile, more and more "volunteers" and "organizers" gather in the dry, dusty field about 6 km south east of Jessen. Several photographers have already set up in front of the tent entrance to watch the moment when the Y81N operators leaves the tent after more than 24 hours. Quiet, factual-sounding scraps of conversation come out of the tent. Some impatience is spreading. "Now stop," one of the bystanders thinks out loud and winks. Then the "cheerleader team" of Lithuanians arrives in a VW Camper and several cars. Their funny T-shirts stand out and their happiness is obvious. Everyone waits and then a familiar sound: the zipper opens and Gedas, LY9A, hurries to the porta-a-loo. "I have waited a long time," he murmurs smiling at each of us waiting for the crucial photo of the two operators. He looks puzzled but gets sympathetic looks from those he passes in his sweaty clothes. It is 32° C and undoubtedly even hotter in the tent. It takes a few more minutes and shortly after Gedas goes back into the tent, the referee and the contest crew seem to complete the formalities.



As the three appear in front of the tent, the clack-clack of cameras shutters start along with applause from the surrounding fans, volunteers and organizers. Mindis' children run towards their beloved daddy and in a heartfelt embrace the family is reunited including XYL Lina after 24 hours. All of a

sudden you can feel a warm, loving camaraderie of all of the Lithuanians and their German friends. They are all happy about what has been achieved because it is something to be proud of. It doesn't get better than this. It is the hour of the new world champions. But Gedas and Mindis do not want to acknowledge it at first. For one point, they are very modest people and they also know that before the logs are verified, nothing is official. Experience has taught them that things can change before the award ceremony. What they do not know at this point is that their lead is probably unassailable by the second-placed German team. 5212 contacts and over 5.9 million points in 24 hours is a great achievement. Nevertheless, Gedas and Mindis are waiting for the log check - modest, professional radio amateurs.



The interview that Ed, DD5LP, has with them at the site has been recorded and videoed by Ralf, DH2FBL. Both return quickly to Wittenberg to deliver the media. Gedas asked me then to take some photos of the volunteers and the contest team. Gedas and Mindis know what they owe their success to the committed and perfect team work by the helpers at Site ABG-3. What distinguishes the LY team as well, is that they are also, outside of the hobby, great people, with whom one is very proud to be friends.



With ABG-3, there was something else: Gradually I got used to the cryptic abbreviations. Now I will remember Annaburg near Jessen as - ABG-3 because it was the pace that created new world champions. It completes a great WRTC snapshot for me that I will never forget.

# Exhausted - but happy: Teams return from their sites to the Luther Hotel

Gradually, the competition teams and their referees arrive at the Luther Hotel in Wittenberg. They have behind them 24 hours of competition. Many thousands of contacts are recorded in the logbooks. Now the USB sticks have been handed over to the log checkers and the logbook files are subjected to strict control. Tomorrow, we'll know more about the final positions of the 63 teams.

It looks highly likely that the team from Lithuania have won the WRTC 2018 by far, with more than 5200 QSOs and more than 5.9 million points. The station was operated with two YAESU FTDX-5000 transceivers. As with all WRTC contest stations, it used a HD Spider Beam with a built-in 40m dipole. A specially made for the WRTC, WIMO dipole antenna was used on 80m. The Spider beam was mounted at 12m height on an aluminum telescopic mast and just below the beam was the support for the 80m dipole.

Paul Bigwood, G3WYW, from prime sponsor YAESU was delighted with the winning team from Lithuania and insisted on congratulating the successful team on site in Annaburg. He had the station shown to him. It was a true "hotspot", because the temperature in the station tent had climbed to almost 40 ° C. "A phenomenal performance of our friends from Lithuania and I am impressed and thrilled at the same time," said Paul in the presence of the team.

#### What are your first impressions after the contest?

Happy, relieved

#### What were the propagation conditions like?

Can't really comment as they are different to at home.

#### How did the SSB / CW contacts split?

Over 30% SSB.

#### Did you have any problems of a technical nature at the site?

No everything worked perfectly.

#### What are your impressions of the volunteers and the organization of the WRTC?

Very happy with both organisation and especially the helpers.

#### What were the most important steps for you in your preparation for the WRTC?

Daily training with Morse Runner and several contests together as a team.

#### What impressions does Wittenberg leave in your memory?

We haven't seen Wittenberg town, the countryside is nice. Perhaps we can walk around Wittenberg on Monday or Tuesday.

# The last seconds oft the Contest: Frank, DM5WF, visited the German top team Manfred, DJ5MW and Stefan, DL1IAO

After the WRTC stations stopped operating at 2:00 pm local time yesterday, DM5WF, Frank, also felt the tension of the past few weeks and months.



Frank sought out all the sites last year and talked to many regional land owners about the WRTC. His investment of thousands of miles and certainly a thousand hours for the WRTC are an incredible achievement.

"Always keeping an eye on the online scoreboard, I headed to our old field day site in Kosilenzien shortly before the end of the contest," Frank reported. Here one of the German teams was located consisting of Manfred Wolf, DJ5MW and Stefan von Balz, DL1IAO. Two well-known figures in the contest scene who came third in the WRTC2014 in the USA.

In a loud voice, Rusty, W6OAT, who had been watching the two competitors for 24 hours as their referee, counts down the last five seconds. "The atmosphere reminds me of a class project during my school time," says Frank. Moments later, the competitors come out of the tent amid the applause of their helper team. One of the helpers shows them the online scoreboard on their mobile phone and only now they learn what the many hours of hard work were worth in the end.

The provisional final result sees Manfred and Stefan in second place. Completely exhausted but happy, the two hug each other. Rusty is obviously also thrilled with the result and confirms the two to have done an excellent job.

Frank's conclusion: "WRTC2018 - you just have to experience it! Many thanks to all from the Y43 club who came here and worked as helpers."

### German team congratulates the winning team

"The LY team have improved, which we did not manage to do as well! We heartily congratulate the Lithuanians", said the runners-up Manfred Wolf, DJ5MW, and Stefan von Baltz, DL1IAO. With their result, both are very satisfied: "It went great for us. We said before the contest that our goal is to finish in the top 10. That we reached second place is a great achievement. Focus mode was Morse telegraphy. Of the total of 4974 contacts, 3620 CW QSOs are in the log. The propagation conditions were positive. The 20m band closed for DX connections earlier than expected. However, sporadic E on 10m allowed good contacts to be made. Also on 15m there were a number of QSOs possible.

Both were pleased about the DX contacts on the 80m and 40m bands. Around 20 QSOs with North America and also a QSO with Brazil are in the log of the 80m band.

"The volunteers were fantastic and our heartfelt thanks go to the organizers of the WRTC 2018," says Manfred, and Stefan nods in agreement. Whether they will compete again in 2022 remains to be seen, because the effort needed is substantial.

# Irina Stieber: In the pile up I was able to "Ausfunken".

Wittenberg. (xv) "With 100 watts to get a pile up to North America on the low bands - that was phenomenal. I was really challenged, and it was great to be able to really get into it, "enthused Irina Stieber (DL8DYL) from Dresden, expressing her personal impressions of the WRTC. Team partner of Maddin Riederer (DL4NAC) from Bayreuth, both have achieved more than 4100 QSOs and about 75% of them have been on CW. For Irina it was amazing what can be achieved with a 12m high dipolet: "I am very pleased that it was relatively easy to reach stations outside of Europe with only this transmitter power." Irina had concentrated on Morse telegraphy. In phases I managed more than 200 contacts per hour.



"I sent it faster than usual, but also adapted to the speed of the calling station, there were only a few repeat requests," she continues. Her team partner Maddin said yesterday after the contest he was very positive about the operating standards of the German stations calling: "The German stations have sent precise and short messages with their call sign and report, there were also no repeat requests or corrections." The notes supplied on operating procedure for this competition in the runup to the WRTC were obviously heeded. Useful to make sure there were many contacts, the special call signs that the Federal Network Agency allocated for the WRTC stations. "With our Y89D call sign we were very popular on the bands." The concentration level needed in the pile ups was probably less than usual. "After a busy night, we had a small headache on Sunday morning before getting into the final hours of the competition," says Irina. Conditions were demanding not only in radio operation but also the weather conditions: "During the day around 30 ° C and at night as cold as in Alaska," someone from the helper team had said. Irina can not make friends with the cold weather: "I had everything there just in case and with the "onion technique" I was able to keep warm, a thick jacket and a blanket were very useful." Irina was grateful for the effort of canadian referee Nick Lekic (VE3EY) and... "Our helpers provided a great service. Whether it was related to the supply of drinks and food or when we needed technical help before the start of the contest, there was always someone approachable and immediately on hand to fulfill every wish, "says the sympathetic Dresden woman, the appreciation of the help is clear. When asked about the station's technology, she raises her eyebrows slightly. "The station setup I have at home is more handy than a WRTC station and there's also the division of labour. When such a station is built, an IT technician is as necessary as well as someone with an overview of the entire wiring system" she tells us.

Whether she will compete again in 2022 at the next WRTC, she keeps her options open. "The needed qualifying competition time puts a strain on the family. Organizing holiday periods on contest weekends is not always family-friendly, "she admits.

All in all, Irina draws a very positive conclusion. "A World Championship is something special and it's great to be there. Apart from the contest, meeting old friends, making new friends, and experiencing this great atmosphere is THE aspect that makes the long road from the first qualifying competition to the last minute of the contest truly worthwhile" she says, heading off to to spend a relaxing afternoon with her family in Wittenberg. The family is happy because they have had to give up Irina for many hours.

# Closing cereonomy - New World Champions honored

World Championship ended with a great closing ceremony



The winners of the World Championship of Radio Amateurs are from Lithuania. Gedas Lucinskas (LY9A) and Mindis Jukna (LY4L) won ahead of the German team with Manfred Wolf (DJ5MW) and Stefan von Baltz (DL1IAO) from Baden-Württemberg. In third place are Chris Hurlbut (KL9A) and Daniel Craig (N6MJ), who became world champions four years ago in Boston.

In total, radio amateurs from all over the world were reached by the 63 competition teams with 262,746 contacts during the 24-hour competition. More than 40 nations were represented in Wittenberg with the competitors and referees.

The trophies were handed over to the winning teams and all teams were very happy..

In his welcome address Christian Janßen, DL1MGB, looked back on the eventful 4 years. Especially on the performance of the great team he formed. Chris called to represent over 300 helpers, four supporters on to the stage, who have performed great work in the background. Oskar Radwan, DL3OF, and Renate Radwan, DG2HUF, managed the warehouse in Jessen. Frank Neumann, DM5WF, has explored the sites and Steffen Kaiser, DL5SFI, acted as chief photographer. They were honored with great applause and a gold medal.

The Jessen Mayor Michael Jahn expressed his appreciation and thanks to the competitors, referees and helpers. "The accomplishments of the helpers are large. To build 65 large antennas - to support the tents and the power generators - that is great. I'm convinced that you can count on radio amateurs, "he said in his speech in front of over 600 World Championship participants - because everyone who helped with this event has the right to consider himself a participant in the World Championship.

An exciting and busy week lies behind all WRTC contributors.

With regard the extensive four-year long preparation, Mayor Jahn stated: "Andreas Winter, DK4WA, and Frank Neumann, DM5WF, from Mühlberg have managed to win over the land owners for this great project. The agricultural cooperatives gladly made their land available. I am proud of our local people. Frank and Andreas gave special thanks for this incredible work in volunteering."

The chairman of the German Amateur Radio Club, Steffen Schöppe, DL7ATE, also sent his thanks. He was represented by Ron Jerke, DG2RON, who heads the District of Brandenburg. Steffen emphasized that there were also many volunteers in the run-up to the event, who bought and processed material and used countless hours or days to organize the smooth running of the World Championship in the background.

The helpers came not only from the host country of the World Championship in Brandenburg and Saxony-Anhalt, but from all over Germany and also from abroad. For this he expressed his heartfelt thanks.

It got a bit more technical in a presentation from Paul Bigwood, G3WYW, the representative of prime sponsor YAESU. He reported on the history and current trends in amateur radio, from the perspective of a manufacturer. For the entire organization he found very complimentary words and expressed his thanks to the organizers.

The presentation of the WRTC trophies was moderated by Randy Thomson, K5ZD. He reported that the evaluation committee received 3500 logs within 16 hours, which could be used for the audit.

The following awards were awarded

- WRTC 2018 SSB Leaders were awarded to Jeff Briggs, VY2ZM and Patrick Briggs, KK6ZM by Michael Jahn
- WRTC 2018 CW Leaders were Tonno Vakh, ES5TV and Tiovo Hallikivi, ES2RR awarded by Ralf Theunert, DK1DSA
- WRTC 2018 Multiplier Leaders were Tonno Vakh ES5TV and Tiovo Hallikivi, ES2RR awarded by Ulf Ehrlich, DL5AXX.
- WRTC 2018 Accuracy Leaders were Leo Slavov, OR2F, and Pascal Lierman, ON5RA awarded by Dietmar Kasper, DL3DXX

Before the main places on the podium were awarded, Chris, DL1MGB, awarded the best youth team award to Alexandru Mancus, YO8TTT, and Leonid Kharchenko, UT5GW, who were the best of the youth teams and finished 14th in the overall standings.

Then the "Best of the Best" were called up.

- The bronze medal went to previous World Champions Chris Hurlbut, KL9A, and Daniel Craig, N6MJ. The trophy was awarded by Uwe, DL8OBF.
- The silver medal was won by Manfred Wolf, DJ5MW, and Stefan von Baltz, DL1IAO. The trophy was presented by Michael Höding, DL6MHW.
- New World Champions are Gedas Lucinskas, LY9A, and Mindis Jukna, LY4L. The trophy was presented by Christian Janßen, DL1MGB.

Michael Jahn and Chris, DL1MGB, ended the awards ceremony with great applause from the audience. A moving moment for the new World Champions and all those involved in the WRTC 2018.

Finally, the WRTC was formally ended by the chairman of the Sanctioning Committee. He also expressed his gratitude for the unforgettable days in Jessen / Wittenberg. He announced with great applause that the next WRTC will take place in Italy.

The WRTC 2018 ended with a celebration where helpers, competitors and referees discussed their great experiences with each other.

### WRTC 2018 Certificates - A Recognition of High Levels of Activity

At the WRTC in July 2018, the 63 Y8 stations logged 262,746 QSOs. All WRTC participants were amazed by the big pile-ups they were able to produce running just 100 watts. In addition to the unusual call signs, the award program was certainly an incentive for the callers.

In the meantime the results are available on the website (www.wrtc2018.de) under the menu item "Activities".

While no log submission was required for the Worked-All-WRTC award, the other awards are based on the logs sent in shortly after the contest. These were used in the rapid evaluation process to check the WRTC competitors log quality. These contributors provided, by their log submissions, help to the log checking team.

All those who submitted a log receives the title "Assistant Judge" and a corresponding certificate. Furthermore, 20 call signs were drawn randomly, who will receive a prize in the next few days.

The winners of the WRTC Sprint, Most QSOs and Distance Challenge ratings can also look forward to receiving a prize.

In the WRTC Sprint, the goal was to work all Y8 calls in as short a time frame as possible. Timing started running from the first QSO. Due to the different distances, a separate score was calculated for each of the 29 WRTC qualifying regions. From 20 of the 29 regions at least one station contacted all 63 Y8 calls. DK2CX was quickest and managed the 63 QSOs in only 56 minutes using the home country advantage. But even from South America 63 contacts were possible as proved by PY2XB.

In the "Most QSOs" ranking OH2BU achieved the best result worldwide with 513 QSOs with WRTC stations - obviously thanks to precise planning and good skip. DLOSLG managed, with 361, the most QSOs in the DL region. Here too the results rankings were carried out according to the 29 regions.

Particularly interesting was the "Distance Challenge", in which all participants compete with each other worldwide. The results list shows PY2XB at the top with 2.3 million kilometers covered. He is followed by K3WW with 1,529,469 km and W3UA with 1,521,413 km. These participants will also receive a commemorative prize in the next few weeks.

The organizers of the WRTC 2018 would like to thank all participants for the support of the many QSOs and the log submissions.

#### WRTC 2018 - a review

After the busy days of the WRTC 2018 and work required after the event, it is time to stand back and review what was achieved.



The organizers can be proud of a successful WRTC. The main goals that have driven us for four years were fulfilled. The dream of the summer fairy tale came true for amateur radio in Germany. Each participant has taken away their special memories that will undoubtedly motivate them over the next few years.

The members of the organizing team have compiled some notes about aspects of the project that are worthy of note.

#### Field operations and technology used

Antenna boss Paul, DL5CW, is pleased with the positive results:

- Despite heavy rain on Thursday, all 65 antenna installations were completed on time
- The previous training courses definitely contributed greatly to this success
- All antennas were ready for the contest with the SWR within the expected range for all antennas

The uniformity of the sites was the responsibility of Uli, DJ2YA. He reports:

- The cooperation with RigExpert providing the ability to load data for multiple sites in their new AntScope2 software was successful
- Intensive preparation work with DL5CW in Jessen from Friday to Tuesday of the week preceding the event including the instruction of the antenna chiefs on Tuesday paid dividends
- Two analyzers failed due to static charges (RigExpert analyzed and repaired the defective units)
- SWR data from ALL sites was backed up for documentation (instructions were followed to the letter making this action 100% successful)
- There was lots of praise for "site quality" and requests from the WRTC2022 team for advice for the Bologna event

The group of 300 helpers was managed by Axel, DL6KVA. He'd like to emphasize:

- The dedication of the helpers (no matter in which area) was exemplary and a major contribution to the success of the WRTC 2018
- Very positive feedback was received both from the competitors and the referees but also from the fellow helpers

- The cooperation in the organization team has always been goal-oriented and has been enjoyable
- The media team at the WRTC should certainly be acknowledged for their work publicizing the WRTC to areas of the hobby who would not normally be involved.

Andy, DK4WA, DARC Regional Manager of Jessen added

- Problems were solved flexibly a generator that appeared to be malfunctioning was reported and a replacement unit was quickly delivered
- An RFI problem from the switching power supply of a competitor's monitor was quickly resolved by a volunteer supplying a suitable replacement power supply

#### Competition

Responsible for the competition was Uwe, DL8OBF, - he was very satisfied:

- The prepared rules and FAQs answered most of the questions in advance Thursday's question time meeting was shorter than expected
- Working with the judging committee was easy
- No thunderstorms or major technical failures affected the competition
- The Y8 call signs created huge pile ups

Log checking and scoring was controlled by Dietmar, DL3DXX.

- Evaluation used a web-based solution based on PHP and MySQL
- 3764 check logs with 1.5 million QSOs were used to cross-check the competitors logs
- Dubious cases were examined manually by the evaluation team, for this purpose audio recordings from the participants were used
- Log checking was already completed by 12 o'clock on Monday

#### Organization and HQ

Chris, DL1MGB, as head of the organization highlights the following points

- The helpers used their own initiative, solving problems by engaging the required people if they were not able to solve the problem themselves.
- After many days in the HQ-Centre, where there were almost always problems to solve, it was
  nice at the closing event to hear from the helpers, participants and guests of their broad
  approval and satisfaction with the event
- Especially nice to hear were the many stories of the local communities around the sites greeting and helping the groups.
- The most moving moment for me this week was when Tine S50A officially declared that the WRTC 2018 was over.

The hotel-based teams reported to Andrea, DL3ABL:

- Andreas, DC6RI, had brought about 1000 shirts and other materials to Wittenberg, which were sorted and bagged by the hotel team prior to the WRTC
- 80 file folders with antenna setup guides and Site Manager manuals were created, each page came in a waterproof presentation case
- The issue of materials (shirts, bags, tickets, score-collection computers, power meters) and the care of all guests was a full-time job virtually non-stop from Tuesday to Tuesday
- The public relations work was very successful. From the point of view of the PR, Michael, DL6MHW, highlighted the following aspects

- The media team ensured the steady release of approximately five articles per day on the WRTC2018 web page and in the online media
- Daily video production and the live streaming of opening and closing was very successful receiving lots of hits.
- There was great interest from the traditional media such as TV, radio and daily newspapers which brought amateur radio into the public eye. All of this work required a high level of effort and professionalism.
- Especially impressive was the processing of over 300 calls to the WRTC hotline, mainly by Felix, DL5XL and Axel, DL6KVA

Ben, DL6RAI, added as the supervisor of IT and live score board

- The website wrtc2018.de was the most important platform for external communication: it was bilingual and target group oriented
- The mailing lists based around the Mailman software formed a linchpin, especially for internal communication
- The ticket system (OTRS) was used extensively during the WRTC for the coordination of work
- The Real Time Scoreboard ran reliably throughout the WRTC, was a great success warranting the large effort involved

Rudolf, DJ3WE, chief fundraiser since the beginning of 2018, was visibly relieved and grateful that he had managed to finance this mammoth project needing to raise more than 600,000 euros in donations.

- 80% of the donations come from the amateur radio community
- Around 40% of all donations were received from Germany and North America
- A major success factor were the many trips and appearances of the WRTC2018 team in the USA
- The amateur radio industry supported WRTC through equipment and cash donations, most notably YAESU as the WRTC Prime Sponsor
- The exhibition of some sponsors in the Luther hotel suffered from a lack of public interest: The room used was too remote. The enthusiasm of the guests about meeting each other along with the tension of the approaching contest in the competitors before the contest meant there was a lack of interest in visiting the sponsors exhibition room. Thankfully the sponsors were satisfied with many face to face individual discussions in a relaxed bar atmosphere and did not regret their commitment to WRTC2018.

#### Conclusion

The records show that WRTC 2018 was a mammoth project. Despite the effort to be brief, this list is very long. The key points above illustrate the diversity and scope of the project. Many more points deserve to be presented in much greater detail.
